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Transparency

Why – sometimes not identifying it as 'abuse'

Need to know what it looks like to act on it

Reputation – there are enough seniors to go around – quality organizations are transparent

Elder Abuse

 \succ Abuse means any action or inaction, misuse of power and/or betrayal of trust or a failure to demonstrate respect by a person against a resident, that the person knew or ought to have known would cause or could reasonably be expected to cause harm to the resident's health, safety, or well-being

Types of Abuse

Physical abuse Financial abuse » Psychological/Emotional abuse Verbal abuse » Sexual abuse » Neglect – self or other

Physical Abuse



The use of physical force that causes pain, discomfort or injury or that is excessive for, or inappropriate in, the circumstances,

~or~

Administering or withholding medication for inappropriate purposes (can also fall under neglect)

Physical – Case Examples PSW assault male with dementia Grandson living in Grandmothers House

> Theft of narcotics/ double dosing

Confinement – locked in the basement

Grandma Bank is Closed



Possible Indicators

- > Unexplained injuries
 > Unexplained bruising
 > "accidents"
 > Unkempt and signs of under/over medication
- Burn marks
- ≻ Etc.

Criminal Code

Assault (Sec. 265 c.c) > Assault with a weapon (Sec. 267 c.c) > Aggravated Assault (Sec. 268 c.c) Forcible Confinement (Sec. 279 c.c) Murder (Sec. 229 c.c) Manslaughter (Sec. 234 c.c)

Physical Abuse Forensic Indicators

> History/Interview
Implausible/vague explanations
Delay in seeking care
Unexplained injuries -past or present
Interaction between senior and caregiver

Financial Abuse



> Any misappropriation or misuse of a senior's money or property

POWER OF ATTORNEY – most common

Financial – Case Examples

Mrs. B – theft by POA

> PSW stolen cheques - \$12000

> PSW takes senior home – Mrs. W

Living in squalor - Cannington

"I know they are taking my money but its my family"



Possible Indicators

- > Unexplained or inability to pay bills
- Refusal to spend money without "permission"
- Unexplained disappearance of personal belongings
- Changed POA or will
- No spending money
- Large bank account withdrawal

Criminal Code

- > Theft (Sec 322 c.c)
- > Theft by holding Power of Attorney (Sec. 331 c.c)
- Stopping Mail with Intent (Sec. 345 c.c)
 Extortion (Sec. 346 c.c)
 Forgery (Sec. 365 c.c)
 Fraud (Sec. 380 c.c)

Psychological/Emotional Abuse

Any action or behaviour that may diminish a persons sense of wellbeing, dignity or self worth.

Includes threatening, insulting, intimidating or humiliating gestures, behaviour or remarks, imposed social isolation or lack of acknowledgement, and infantilization

Psychological/ Emotional – Case Examples

Grandmother stay in your room until I leave for work

Diaper – "product"

Gas Lighting

I just want my dog back

Verbal Abuse

Verbal Abuse means: Any form of verbal communication of a belittling or degrading nature which may diminish the senior's sense of wellbeing, dignity or self worth



Shouting,

- inappropriate tone of voice or manner of speaking
- Talking to an older person like a child
- Hurtful language
- Name calling
- Put downs
 - Insults
- Sarcasm/ Mocking
 - Threats
- Swearing/ vulgar language

Verbal – Case Examples

Shut Up – RN

"Just hurry up and die"

Child like talk

Criminal Code

Intimidation (Sec. 423 c.c)
 Uttering Threats (Sec. 264.1 c.c)
 Harassing Telephone Calls (Sec. 372.3)

Sexual Abuse

Sexual Abuse means:

- Any consensual or non-consensual touching, behaviour or remarks of a sexual nature or sexual exploitation that is directed towards a senior by a person in a professional position of trust
- Any non-consensual touching, behaviour or remarks of a sexual nature or sexual exploitation directed towards a senior by any other person

Sexual – Case Examples

Spousal – 'marital rights'

Senior sex offenders

> Health care providers

Does Sexual Assault to residents from staff happen????

70-year-old Toronto woman with advanced dementia was raped in her bed
Allegedly by a male nurse identified
Staff say he "regularly disappeared on shift "without explanation."

46 yr old charge with sexual assault

Possible Indicators

- > Genital infections
- > Frequent urinary tract infections
- > Pain, bruising, bleeding in genital areas

Criminal Code

- Sexual Assault (Sec. 271 c.c)
- Sexual Assault with a weapon, threats to a third party or causing bodily harm (Sec. 272 c.c)
- > Aggravated Sexual Assault (Sec. 273 c.c)

Neglect

The failure to provide a senior with the care and assistance required for health, safety or well being

Neglect – Case Examples

Daughter got too busy

"I am going to see God"



Possible Indicators

- Failure to thrive
- Malnourished
- Dehydrated
- > Poor living conditions
- > Odour

Incontinence productsUnder/ over medicated

Criminal Code

 Criminal Negligence Causing Bodily Harm or Death (Sec. 220-21 c.c)
 Breach of Duty to Provide Necessities (Sec. 215 c.c)

When is it not a crime?

- Interventions are required but what might they look like...
- Ethical obligation to intervene
- Counselling victim/ accused/ others
- > Teaching/ Health Teaching
- Support
- This is not all about being punitive...its about prevention of repeating incidents

> Who can I tell?

> With consent, anyone

Some information under PHIPPA

Tombstone information

Anything that is a matter of public record

P.H.I.P.A (Personal Health Information Protection Act)

- Sec 3- Definition of Health Information Custodian:
- > Health care practitioner
- LTC service provider
- > CCAC
- Hospitals, psych facilities
- Charitable Homes, Homes for the Aged, Rest Homes
- > Pharmacies, laboratories

P.H.I.P.A (Personal Health Information Protection Act)

Sec 40 (1)- Disclosures Related to Risks

A health information custodian may disclose personal health information about an individual if the custodian believes on reasonable grounds that the disclosure is necessary for the purpose of eliminating or reducing a significant risk of serious bodily harm to a person or group of persons."

Ethical Considerations

When to do nothing vs. ethical requirements (abuse as defined by who – my son Jacob)

Considering all aspects of intervention

Respect for choice

> Understand the relationship of the victim and abuser (is it really ABUSE)

Respect Autonomy

What is autonomy?

- Older adults who are capable have rights and we need to be sensitive to that
- Older adults who are deemed incapable have still have rights.
- What could be negative consequences of unwanted intervention - withdrawal of affection or increase in abuse
- Police can't do anything without cooperation of victim/ witnesses



- Can fluctuate
- Capacity assessors/ assessment for capacity
- Testing understanding facts and consequences
- Can be capable in one area but incapable in another
