Who we are


- One of 35 centres in Ontario

- On call 24/7 to respond to victims of domestic violence or sexual assault
- Also available office hours for consultation and counselling
- Offer training in the community, present to a variety of groups on issues of sexual and intimate partner violence

Sexual Assault Domestic Violence

- By definition any unwanted contact of a sexual nature: fondling, kissing, forced intercourse
- We see men, women and children who have been sexually assaulted
- Intimate partner violence i.e., husband, boyfriend, ex-husband, ex-boyfriend, same sex relationships
- Abuse may be emotional, verbal, financial, physical
- All women 16 yrs and over screened at triage

Sexual Assault Definition...

- Sexual assault is any form of unwanted sexual activity including fondling, touching, and/or penetration that is forced upon another person without that person's consent.
- Consent is an active choice and the voluntary agreement of two adults to engage in sexual activity. Someone who is under the influence of medication, drugs/alcohol is not in the position to give consent.

- Forensic evidence collection












Myths, misconceptions and psycho-education


- A lot of what we do is dispelling myths

Public Education and Awareness


- Rethinking "prevention"


Domestic Violence

Domestic violence is any use of physical or sexual force, actual or threatened, in an **intimate relationship**. Although both men and women can be victims of domestic violence, the overwhelming majority of this violence involves abusing women.

Barriers to leaving

- Fear of more violence
- Shame/humiliation
- Believes she's partly to blame
- Hope that he will change
- Fear of losing children
- Family pressures
- Religious beliefs/pressures

- Isolation
- Immigration issues
- Loss of social status
- Immobilized by psychological trauma
- Belief that marriage is until death
- Financial controls
- Unaware of laws

Importance for social workers and social service workers

- Impacts all areas of practice

- "In reality, to remain neutral is to collude with the abusive man, whether or not that is your goal."



Intervention with youth...


- Only half of all kids 11-14 claim to know the warning signs of a bad/hurtful relationship
- 2 in 5 kids 11-14 in relationships know friends who have been verbally abused -called names, put down, or insulted via cell phone, MSN, Facebook, etc
- More than 1 in 3 teens report that their partners wanted to know where they were and who they were with all the time
- Among teens who took a course on dating abuse, 75% say it helped them learn about the signs of abusive relationships





